Prime Time collects the social security numbers of individuals who are incentive applicants. The social security number is required to issue incentive recipients IRS 1099-MISC forms at the end of the year as mandated by current tax law.* Please note that Prime Time takes your privacy very seriously, and we have multiple precautions, protocols, and processes in place to ensure that your confidential information is properly maintained and safeguarded.

You are only required to complete a new W-9 form if your name or address has changed since you last submitted it. If you are unsure if something has changed, please submit a new one.

*You will only be issued a 1099-MISC form from Prime Time if you received \$600.00 or more in incentives during the year. Prime Time will not send you a MISC-1099 form if you were issued a PayPal incentive. The threshold for reporting revenue from Paypal is 200 transactions per individual person or \$20,000 in payments. PayPal is responsible for sending you a MISC-1099 form if you have reached that threshold.

<u>DON'T</u> include your employer identification number (EIN) instead of your social security number (SSN). Prime Time can issue a check to a place of business; however, we cannot dictate how the company will then distribute the funds. If this incentive check is being cut directly to you, the individual, your social security number is required.

Purpose of Form

An individual or entity (Form W-9 requester) who is required to file an information return with the IRS must obtain your correct taxpayer identification number (TIN) which may be your social security number (SSN), individual taxpayer identification number (ITIN), adoption taxpayer identification number (ATIN), or employer identification number (EIN), to report on an information return the amount paid to you, or other amount reportable on an information return. Examples of information returns include, but are not limited to, the following.

• Form 1099-INT (interest earned or paid)

- Form 1099-DIV (dividends, including those from stocks or mutual funds)
- Form 1099-MISC (various types of income, prizes, awards, or gross proceeds)
- Form 1099-B (stock or mutual fund sales and certain other transactions by brokers)
- Form 1099-S (proceeds from real estate transactions)
- Form 1099-K (merchant card and third party network transactions)
- Form 1098 (home mortgage interest), 1098-E (student loan interest), 1098-T (tuition)
- Form 1099-C (canceled debt)
- Form 1099-A (acquisition or abandonment of secured property)

Use Form W-9 only if you are a U.S. person (including a resident alien), to provide your correct TIN.

If you do not return Form W-9 to the requester with a TIN, you might be subject to backup withholding. See What is backup withholding, later.
